





RIDING THE WAVE INTO RADIO HISTORY

At The Age Of 92 Music Legend Hal Jackson Keeps The Good Times Rockin And Rollin

NEW YORK, NY — He's been called an icon, a legend, a pioneer, a crusader and an American original. At age 92 Hal By Fred Yaeger Jackson is indubitably the king of radio disc jockeys, the quintessential master of his craft and the spirit of high-energy entertainment. He's also the oldest DJ in the United States still flying high on the airwaves decades after many of his counterparts and colleagues have retired. And he has no intention of giving up his lofty mantle, firmly entrenched behind the microphone at one of New York's hottest stations. It's where he's most comfortable, and most coveted.

Listeners who tune in to rhythm and blues station WBLS 107.5 FM in New York every week for "Sunday Classics" from noon to 4:00 p.m. know the voice, the man, and the legend behind it. Hal Jackson makes it look - well, sound - easy, only because he's the consummate professional. And he's a man of firsts; the first African American radio announcer in network radio; the first Black play-by-play sportscaster in America; the first co-owner of a Black radio station in New York City; the first African American inducted into the National Association of Broadcasters; the first African American host of a jazz program on the ABC network; not to mention a myriad other "firsts." Suffice it to say Hal Jackson is also the first of his kind to break barriers, move mountains, make waves, and entertain countless millions with his special

As co-founder and group chairman of Inner City Broadcasting, Hal Jackson seemingly invented the concept of Black brand of soulful sophistication. radio entertainment. Born in 1915 and reared in Washington, DC, he attended Howard University, where he broadcast the university's home baseball games as well as local American Negro Baseball League games over radio station WOOK in the nation's capital. At the age of 24 he approached the owners of Washington's WINX radio (then owned by The Washington Post) with the idea of producing a radio show. Despite being confronted with the wall of racism that permeated much of the country in that era. Hal Jackson prevailed. In doing so he broke new ground in establishing Black entertainment in America. The seeds of his prescient vision were to bear fruit for decades to come.

Hal Jackson used his radio pulpit not to proselytize, but to promote the achievements of Black Americans of the day. He interviewed entertainers, authors, teachers, scientists, sports legends, motivators, mover, shakers and great thinkers all making their own contribution to the American mosaic.

With his unique approach to entertainment and his ability to attract talent, Hal Jackson broadened his horizons, and expanded his reach into larger and more influential markets, none more so than New York, the country's number-one market. In the 1950s and 1960s he was a fixture on the New York airwaves. Hal Jackson broadcast daily on WLIB, WMCA; ABC network; and was host of a TV program on NBC. He also hosted successful live weekly concerts from Palisades Amusement Park, Jackson's HBJ enterprise featured some of the most powerful and sought-after acts of the day, from The Supremes and The Temptations to The Four Tops and Stevie Wonder. Hal Jackson has always cultivated talent, nurtured it, and he knows how to showcase it.

Throughout his storied career Hal Jackson has remained a benevolent and driving force in the community at large, particularly with regard to minority youth. He has created numerous programs to assist youth in living up to their full potential while spearheading countless efforts aimed at lifting their careers, and their spirits. Hal Jackson's Talented Teens International (originally conceived as Miss Black Teenage America) has evolved into a worldwide talent competition. Held in such venerated locales as New York's Madison Square Garden and the Coconut Grove in California, the annual event will be held this year in the British Virgin Islands on the Island of Tortola from Saturday, July12th 2008 through Sunday, July 20th 2008.

At 92, Hal Jackson has the energy and the enthusiasm of a man of 29. As a broadcaster, entrepreneur, radio and TV personality, philanthropist, author and missionary for good causes everywhere, he exudes class and charisma. And he shows no signs of slowing down any time soon.



The first contest was held under the title "Miss Black Teenage America" on July 28 in Atlanta, Georgia and was taped for television syndication. The winner was Miss Texas, June Kelly.



1972

The site changed to New York City and the location of the contest was Madison Square Garden's Felt Forum. Miss Texas won again, this time her name was Cynthia Lewis.



1973

The title changed to "Miss U.S. Talented Teen Pageant & Revue" and Miss Edna Hill from Maryland was the winner. Dr. Hill is currently the 1st Black plastic surgeon in the state of Maryland.



1974

Talent, intellect, determination and the ability to perform under pressure, all qualities that characterize Miss Missouri, **Denise** DuMaine** who won the crown at Town Hall in New York City.



1975

Miss Georgia won the crown in New York City at Town Hall, Rence Crutcher tours and sings with Harry Belafonte.



1976

Due to requests to extend its benefits to teens in other countries, the title was changed to "Hal Jackson's Talented Teens International." The 1st international finals took place in St. Croix, U.S. Virgin Islands, the winner was Miss New York, Karen McClellan.



1977

HJTTI offers an educational experience and a unique opportunity for thousands of teenagers 13 to 16 years who have a performing talent. *Melody Smith* from New Jersey was the winner at the Longhorn Theatre in Hollywood, California.



1978

Each year thousands of young ladies walk through the doors of HJTTI sponsors around the world. The winner's door opened for Miss Connecticut, Sheryl Piland and she was crowned by Michael Jackson at the Coconut Grove in Los Angeles.



1979

HJTTI helps to raise the academic achievement of young ladies by providing scholarships to assist in education. This year's scholarship recipient was Angela Pollack. Angela resided in New Jersey and was crowned at the Coconut Grove in Los Angeles.



1980

HJTTI assists young women by helping them express themselves with imagination and intelligence. Annette Jones expressed herself well and is currently a member of "101 North" signed with Capitol Records. Miss California won in L. A.

1981

Returning from California to share in the 50th Anniversary of the Waldorf Astoria, HJTTI enters its second decade from the worlds' premier city, New York. Miss Kimberly, Brooks from Baltimore, Maryland won the crown.



1982

HJTTI gives ladies the opportunity of displaying their talents before a large audience, on a prestigious stage such as the John F. Kennedy Center For the Performing Arts in Washington D.C., where Kristel Henderson, Miss U.S. Virgin Islands took the title.



1983

HJTTI assists in building self-esteem, self-confidence, self-discipline and positive values. Miss New York, *Delise Jones* possesses all of these qualities and is currently teaching in the New York school system. Miss Jones displayed her talents in California.



1984

The contest was held in Montego Bay, Jamaica on an extraordinary summer evening under the stars. The winner resided in New Jersey...her name Michelle Thomas.



1985

HJTTI competitions are conducted by civic-minded organizations and individuals. This year's winner is a ballet dancer who is currently dancing with the Dance Theatre of Harlem. Tail Jimeney "wowed" the judges at the Coconut Grove in Los Angeles.



1986

Prizes for the winners include scholarships, exposure to the music and film industries, and travel abroad which enhances cultural awareness. Owers, an accomplished violinist took the crown on stage at the Apollo in New York City.



1987

Cool breezes blew through the hair of the HJTTI contestants when they visited St. Croix, St. John and performed live in St. Thomas. The winning contestant was Tannay. Townsend who hails from Carson, California



1988

The age of entering contestants was raised to 17. The HJTTI contest was held at the Arie Crown Theatre and King Down Winston a gymnast from New Jersey stole the judges' hearts.



1989

HJTTI was designed as an outlet for untapped talent as well as training in staging, choreography, poise, grace, and diction. Tamica Ellis, a young lady from Wisconsin possessed all of those qualities and won on the Apollo stage in Harlem, U.S.A.



1990

For 20 years Mr. Jackson has taken on the tremendous task of providing a launching pad for hundreds of thousands of young ladies into the entertainment field. The Wiltern Theatre in Los Angeles was the stage, the winner Rellisha Rayford from Detroit.

Naomi s European adventure

As strolled through London's Heathrow Airport. I felt a sense of queen-like regality. received smiles, nods and waves of approval from travelers of many different cultural backgrounds and ethnicities. It was my crown that had been placed upon my head along with my Hal Jackson Talented Teen International 2007 sash, which was draped across my torso, that they recognized. As I boarded the plane, I gave my last queen wave to the heart of England and departed a country that thrives of culture and history. sat next to the window and pondered over my memories, while looking out onto the landscape of London as it decreased in size. I thought to myself, I must be dreaming. Did I just travel to London, England and see all the historical buildings, statues, and monuments? Was I just inside the Eiffel Tower, where I gazed upon the city of Paris?

Reminiscing on all of the amazing and exhilarating moments, while the plane flew me back into Seattle, Washington remembered the first day my state director and I stepped out of the black cab and into the heart of Leicester Square. London. We then checked into the luxurious five star Radisson Hotel, which was decorated with a cutting edge modern décor. Later on that night we both greeted Uncle Hal and Auntie Debi, for the first time in a month ever since my victory on July 28, 2007 for Internationals. Also present were two previous Queens of Internationals 2004 and 2006. Both were from Trinidad and Tobago. Raquel Winchester reign was 2006, while Nicola DaryImple's was in 2004; they too were experiencing London and Paris for the first time. First we started out the intercultural week with satisfying our pallets in an authentic Italian Bistro. As the day moved forward, the excitement and anticipation grew tremendously when we were told we would be attending a theater to watch the European version of the musical "Fame"

The next morning, we got an even earlier start than the day before. Our first endeavor would be to board The Original Sightseeing Bus, which gave an eclectic tour of London. Peering through my intrigued eyes at the historical buildings and monuments, I became astonished when we drove by St. Paul Cathedral and how it was being restored, after so many centuries of it standing. We walked the historic outskirts of the Westminster Abbey, a major land mark in the heart of London, which is also the site of Coronation for the English Monarchy. After we finished touring in the sightseeing bus, we moved with deliberate haste, so as not to miss the Catamaran Cruisers, which was the four on the water of London. My attention was diverted towards the historical bridges and their intricate architectural structure. The bridges that we gazed our curious eyes upon was the Tower Bridge and the London Bridge, both bridges were ingenuously constructed in 17th century and still meets and exceeds modern day structural codes. After that day of touring in the heart of London, we all returned back to our lavish hotel rooms and try to let our tiresome bodies adjust to the European time, which was 6 hours ahead.

On the third day, we woke to encounter another new and thrilling experience, but this time it was attending the most lively and worldwide known carnival of the year in London, the Notting Hill Carnival. We walked to the Piccadilly Circus which took













all of us out of the heart of Leicester Square. Then we rode the bus towards the port of the world, which was the Notting Hill Gate Carnival. Vibrant costumes, music, exotic food, languages and traditional dances expressed every culture in a different way. At this particular carnival I had a craving for Americanized confections, until I was introduced to sugar cane. Returning back Leicester Square we ate at an Indian Restaurant, titled just that Indian Restaurant. It was such an honor to be in the presence of Uncle Hal, especially as he wore a genuine smile of gratification upon his face after watching his Queens being introduced into an entirely different way of living outside of our countries.



The very next day we traveled to Windsor Castle, where I received a chance to actually look at the precise historical architecture that the British hand crafted over centuries ago. I was astonished looking at the intricate detail of golden angelic images and painting on every ceiling inside the castle, while listening to the audio tour guide. The castle took centuries to make, but it was the mere fact that the British created something so beautiful and sturdy, that even Queen Elizabeth II lives in it to this very day. When the tour of the Windsor Castle was over, we headed towards the ancient Stonehenge; these particular stones have been sitting in the same position and area for 5,000 years. They originally came from South Wales located in England and have been dragged by man 240 miles to the Salisbury Plains also located in England. Grateful for our eyes to be able to see the greatness of history we headed towards the Roman Baths, this was one of the most highlights of the visit. Baffled by being in the same ancient place as the elite Roman scholars and aristocrats, who were the first to invent and experience hot tubs also known as "Jacuzzis." We ended our night with an experience of the world known play Phantom of the Opera, as an aspiring actress you know I was in my element.

The entire last day we spent in Europe, we took a 2 hour train ride to Paris, France on the Eurostar to see the lifestyle and culture of the French. We indulged ourselves on authentic French cuisine at the restaurant Voltaire. As Mrs. Jenkins and Auntie Debi decided to go shop for more souvenirs Nicola, Raquel, and took upon the opportunity to go to a garden in Paris and walked around to see the beautiful scenery. Then we visited the Eiffel Tower, and cruised on a tour boat through the heart of Paris. Once again I was in amazement on how the Europeans preserve their history and culture through their monuments, statues, and buildings. McDonalds has nothing on the authentic French fries in France, they were "doigt bon lechage!"

Soon after, we returned back to the Radisson Hotel and prepared ourselves for departure the following day. I truly didn't want to leave just yet, but as you know all good things have to come to an end. I am deeply grateful for having the opportunity to spend quality time with Uncle Hal and Auntle Debi, who treated me with such love and kindness. Uncle Hal and Auntle Debi you have planted a seed that will only produce greatness as your previous Queens have already proven. Thank you and God Bless.

"When it's nice ... do it twice."

It was not going to be just another vacation. I was finally going to have my first European experience. On the 23rd of August 2007, excited and anxious, Miss HJTTI 2006 Raquel and I departed Trinidad to arrive at London where we met the reigning queen Naomi and her chaperone as well as Mr. and Mrs. Jackson ... then the activities began.

We went to numerous tours which allowed us to expand our knowledge of the history of London and Paris. One notable tour was 'The Original Tour of London' where we visited Buckingham Gate, St. Paul's Cathedral and Westminster Abbey. Additionally, we visited the Windsor Castle where we saw the Queen Mary's Dolls' House, St. George's Chapel, the largest dining table in the world and most importantly the guards in red and black with fluffy hats. I also got a picture with them...ha ha. I must mention that we also visited Stonehenge and the Roman Baths in Bath City. In Paris, we went to the renowned Eiffel tour and the Louvre. I was able to see for myself that the French are indeed very affectionate and are never shy to show it in public like my Caribbean people.

Many other cultural expressions that I was not exposed to in my home country were quite prominent in Leicester Square where our hotel in London was located. Mrs. Jackson referred to it as the 'Times Square' of London. If you stood in Leicester Square, you will be amazed to see a 'callaloo' of cultures around you. When you walk the streets, you will hear numerous different languages being spoken by persons from various races, ethnicities and nationalities.

I even had the cherished opportunity to meet some of these people. One such event that permitted this was the Notting Hill Carnival. It was the major event that showcased the high levels of cultural pluralism existing in this metropolitan country. There were representatives from France, Italy, China, Japan, Australia, Chile and many other regions including the most dynamic and the largest group; the Caribbean. It is said that approximately 2 million people visit the country to participate in this particular event, so one can just imagine how many nationalities were present. At the Carnival, there were many different stalls present, all of which literally gave the public a slice of the Caribbean.

In fact, Naomi and Mrs. Jenkins had the pleasure of tasting Trinidad's famous 'sugar cane', the plant material mainly used to produce sugar, and guess what? I think they loved it. I believe the words went something like, 'It's so pure and rich...hmmm'. We also tasted ackee and saltfish, a Jamaican dish, which I fell in love with. It was deecellicious.

The British culture was not to be out done during my time in London, as there was the evident difference in terminology. For example, 'bacon' for the English was 'ham' for us and our 'elevator' was replaced with their 'lift'.

Eating, speaking and sightseeing were not the only parts of my European experience. I had the pleasure of experiencing the creative and performance arts as well. These events included the stage production 'Fame' at the Shaftesbury Theatre and the 'Phantom of the Opera' at Her Majesty's Theatre. Viewing such stage productions was wonderful, as all three queens saw performances in their specific fields of opera, drama, and ballet, on a professional level ... and LIVE!!! These events exemplified just how much literature, art (graphics) and history are cherished in this modern society. Added to the performing arts, their fondness for these things are displayed everyday simply on the walls of their buildings. The architecture is breath-taking. The presents of bridges and large rivers possess historic value as they served to facilitate trade and transport in previous times. Today, they use it as an avenue to share their history with tourist by using fairies and buses. The fact that they take pride in their history and preserve it as they do is admirable to me.

The staff at the hotel was courteous and helpful, not to mention warm-hearted toward us, unlike the weather, which was 22 degrees Celsius on the best day. This was another significant difference between where I came from and London. The time difference between Trinidad and Tobago and London was that London was five hours ahead of our time, which was a bit difficult to adjust to. Up until the last day I had trouble adjusting to the time so much that I over slept. Luckily our Romanian taxi driver said he will wait as we (Raquel and I) are beautiful ladies. Thank God, other wise we would just have had to stay in London, which actually would not have been a bad thing ... at all.

One of the things I treasured most from this trip was receiving renewed strength to press towards unlimited success. Persons met and discussions I had, throughout this journey, from my point of departure from my homeland, to the time I got back, reminded why I should work hard, keep focused and enjoy the blessings of life. More importantly, it reminded me that the only person that can limit my success in life is me, once God wills it. Thank you, to all who contributed to that,

His drive for music and entertainment put him right in the center of the 70's music boom. He was a recording drummer at the age of 15 and by age 17, he was a DJ involved in the emergence of rap music. While at City College of New York, he got involved with WCCR City College Radio, where he was part of a group of young men who helped to change the music scene in New York. The group included people like Russell Simmons of Def Jam, Jerry Roebuck of Black Expo, and Andre Harrell founder of Uptown Records. In the late 1970's, Mr. Blyden's skills caught the eye of world famous promoter Sid Bernstein of Beatles fame, and he was exposed to the big side of the entertainment world. For the next couple of decades, Mr. Blyden worked with most major artists in the music and entertainment business.



He was Technical Director and Production Coordinator of the Apollo Theatre from 1982 thru 1989. During this time, he helped develop the NBC Television show 'Showtime at the Apollo'. His international clients include Paramount Films, Aero Films, Caribbean Tourism Organization CTO Special Events, plus many more. Mr. Blyden has had a long history with Inner City Broadcasting and Mr. Hal Jackson, promoting and producing many events for them. Mr. Blyden returned to the British Virgin Islands in 1989 where he brought his marketing skills and worldwide connections to help develop the events marketing industry. He now owns radio station ZVCR 106.9FM and his own marketing events business, Neil Blyden Associates.

Nadine Shaw

Nadine Shaw Abram is the Production Supervisor/Script Coordinator for Hal Jackson Talented Teens International Scholarship competition for the last 10 years. She is a former HJTTI, crowned Miss New York 1982. After winning the title, Nadine immediately became and continues to be a "recruitment ambassador" for the talented teens program. 




